

A TRIBUTE TO THE LATE FRED MATSON,

The following report was submitted by this Society to the St. George-Sutherland Leader as a tribute to the well-known Fred Matson from information given by his niece; we repeat it for the interest of our members.

"Yowie Bay boat builder, Fred Matson, who died. early in December aged 94, earned a reputation for quality craftsmanship which spread as far as the United States.

Born with a twin brother, Oscar, to Frederick and Ethel in Miranda, Mr. Matson spent a large part of his childhood helping his father operate the family-owned Audley boat hire service in Royal National Park.

However, it was Mr. Matson's Finnish grandfather, Frederick, who became his mentor in the craft of boat building and fostered his fascination for boating revolutions, particularly outboard motors.

Mr. Matson introduced Yowie Bay to the outboard motor and in 1915, became the first marine enthusiast to fit a two horse power motor to a small rowboat.

Mr. Matson nurtured the skills his grandfather passed to him and by the age of 21, he and Oscar were taking, orders at, their Yowie Bay boat shed for Matson Brothers skiffs, launches, cruisers and cedar row boats

The bond between the brothers was strengthened when they married sisters Gwen and Flo Cope.

The Matsons eventually moved their booming business to a Caringbah workshop, now the site of Kareena Private Hospital.

In 1939, the brothers closed shop to become Department of Defence inspectors for the duration of World War 11.

Matson Brothers re-opened after the war and successfully traded into the next decade.

Fred and Oscar retired after 42 years, and Oscar died in 1969

Vale, Fred Matson.

THE PARKE DAVIS STORY - PART II ONE OF THE SHIRE'S LEADING INDUSTRIES (Contributed by George Heavens)

There was need to expand, but precious little money with which to do it. The partners had problems. Despite the company's precarious financial position, as well as a financial slump felt by business nationwide in 1873, the partners embarked upon an expansion programme. The struggling company first took the name of Parke, Davis & Company on 16th November, 1871. The partners were Mr Parke and Mr Davis, together with special partners William H. Stevens and John R. Grout, each of whom contributed financial backing.



Construction was begun that summer on a new brick-laboratory in an outlying area of the city near the Detroit River waterfront and this became the first of a great complex of buildings that house the firm today.

At the end of 1876, the books of the firm showed a profit for the year of \$4675.00. Thus, after ten long years of heartbreaking work, with little reward, the turning-point had come and in June 1878 the company paid its first dividend. Despite many problems that it has had to face, the firm of Parke Davis has never missed paying a dividend since that time. Ten years without a profit must have been mighty discouraging. In 1881 a 50% stock dividend was issued and capitalisation was doubled.

While triumphs such as these were taking place in the laboratories, the eyes of the founders were lifted toward more distant horizons and, by 1880, sales had reached almost the half million mark. There were many more untapped areas to explore.

To further bolster its sources of crude drugs, Parke Davis sent Dr Henry Rusby to South America in 1885 to study the medical flora and to buy cocoa. A young botanist of considerable promise Dr Rusby had been assisted by the firm to complete his medical training before employment. During his South American trip

he crossed the continent from Peru to the mouth of the Amazon and, despite incredible hardships, brought back a number of new drugs used by the natives of South America. A number of these were tested and subsequently introduced into medicine.

With sales volume growing steadily during the next few years, thought was given to the possibility of expanding into the English-speaking world outside the United States. To this end arrangements were made in 1884 with outside sales agents in London and in Sydney, Australia.

The third decade of the team of Parke Davis brought results both bitter and sweet. Sales were zooming and the new lines of superior products were gaining wide acceptance. In 1889, sales were over the one million and profits passed the \$200,000 mark but President Parke became ill and had to take a year's leave of absence.

In 1891, storm clouds were beginning to gather about the head of George Davis. The restless, debonair Davis evidently could not stand the temptation of success. He lived well, entertained a great deal and loved going to the horse races. Though he embarrassed his fellow officers of the company with his financial irregularities, the kindly, gentle Parke was reluctant to give in to those who demanded that Davis be removed. Parke realised that a great deal of the company's past, and indeed current success, was due to Davis's daring and doing.

However, the time came when action was deemed necessary. The thirty year era of Parke and Davis ended in November 1896 when, according to the Minutes of a Special Meeting of the Board of Directors, Davis tendered a brief note of resignation, which was accepted. The office of Consulting Manager was created for him and he was granted a leave of absence of six months. The Minutes of a special Board Meeting, 4th December, 1896, say simply that George S. Davis's stock had been sold. Following the Annual Meeting, 19th January, 1897, the Board members elected by stockholders were T.D. Buhl, D.C. Whitney and others and, for the first time the name of Davis was missing.

The Parke Davis story in the next ten years was largely the story of Mr Whitney and Mr Buhl. Although both were non-drug people, both had been stock-holders for some years and had financial relations with the company. Fortunately, they had the guidance from experienced President Parke for a couple of years.

Then on 8th February, 1899, while on a visit to California, Mr Parke suddenly died.

Theodore Buhl succeeded to the presidency of the company. Mr Warren, who had started with the company as an errand boy in the New York Branch, had come to Detroit in 1886; had demonstrated remarkable ability for some years and had been in charge of the Sales Department. He became General Manager and doubtless would have taken an even more significant role in the company, had his career not been terminated suddenly by his untimely death in November 1903.

A description of the company at the turn of the century: the Detroit plant was described as a hollow square of dull brick buildings, mostly three storey, facing a high wooden fence, facing the Detroit River. The offices faced Atwater Street. Employees numbered somewhere near the 900 mark - mostly girls.

In 1899, it was decided to shorten the working hours: the week to now consist of a 54 hour instead of a 55. (Big deal! - G.H.H.)

In 1900 manufacturing laboratories were listed in many new places including Canada, England and there was an Australasian Depot in Sydney, Australia. Total sales at the turn of the century were just on six million dollars. Employees rode to the work place on bicycles, for the most part. The Directors were driven to their meetings in carriages and earned an honorarium of ten dollars for each meeting they attended. Of interest - expenditure of twenty-four thousand dollars for advertising during the year 1900 was O.K'd. George Davis continued to show up in the Minutes - sometimes in good grace; sometimes not so good. However, the company continued to pay him a stipend each month until his death in 1930.

A thriving business in Australia led to opening a branch house in Sydney under the direction of Cyril C. Murray in 1902. The company was shocked however in 1903 by the unexpected death of its General Manager, William M. Warren at only 40 years of age. Frank G. Ryan succeeded him.

1907 was to mark another year of change in Parke Davis affairs. President T.D. Buhl, whose strong hand and executive mind had guided the reorganisation of Parke Davis after Hervey Parke's death, and under whose direction-the company had doubled its sales and profits, died in April 1907. Since 1907, many new vaccines have been developed and many older ones have been dropped. Research shifted from bacterial vaccines to those of viral origin in more recent decades.

Then in 1914 came the first World War and this brought problems. A huge fire at Parkdale destroyed much valuable company property.

EARLY HISTORY AND FORMATION OF THE SCOTTISH RIFLES <u>1885 – 1914</u> PART II

The original public meeting of Scotchmen, at which it was decided to form a Scottish Corps, was held at the Town Hall, Sydney on 26 August, 1885, the Chairman being Sir Norman McLaurin, a staunch sympathiser, whose son had long been a valued officer of the Regiment.

The conditions to be faced were not encouraging; the Government would only agree to give each member, on formation, the ugly Reserve green jacket, a pair of trousers and a helmet, which the Commanding Officer would not accept, and allow the Corps two pounds at the end of each year for each member who qualified efficient.

The proposal was taken by Scotchmen, spurred on by the Russian War Scare, on the understanding that each member would have to contribute two pounds towards his uniform and those who did not serve would help as honorary members to defray the initial expenses of the corps. The offer of a Scottish Corps was made to and accepted by the Government. The Sydney Reserve Corps of Scottish Rifles was gazetted on 5 November, 1885.

The Scotchmen who were to become honorary members of the Corps proved, with a limited number of exceptions, broken reeds and instead of having a comfortable cash balance it entered the cold military--world with a millstone of debt.

At first members mainly consisted of Scotchmen over the age of 20, born in Scotland but this was extended to the vast majority of members who were Australian born but of Scottish extraction. Enrolment was good at first but after the excitement died down it fell off so that by June 1886 the strength was approximately 350.

In December 1885 a large meeting of enrolled members decided to adopt the kilt uniform of the Black Watch but the Military Authorities would not authorize it. A thin red line was added to the Black Watch Tartan and eventually a New Zealand firm was able to supply.

The adoption of the kilt increased the financial difficulties as the initial expense was heavy. It was not until May 1889 that the Corps

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was able to parade in full dress and then only through the members contributing one pound ten shillings each towards the cost. The first kilts were imported from Scotland but in a few years Vicars Mills of Sydney were able to produce a satisfactory kilt tartan cloth.

The uniform question, the initial difficulties and expense the Corps had to encounter, the lukewarmness and indifferent management to which the Volunteer movement was subjected by the Military authorities, the out of date "Hay" rifles served out to the Corps, all affected it unfavourably in the early days and attendances fluctuated considerably.

The progress of the Corps under the difficulties it had to contend with, was naturally very slow and only the most meagre Capitation Grants were earned year by year. But amongst the early members were some who knew not the word 'failure" and Scotch-like, the greater the difficulty, the greater the determination to succeed.

And so the years passed on.

In 1887 the Corps had the misfortune to lose its Commanding Officer who was drowned at sea.

In 1888 it made a very favourable impression at the Queen's Birthday Review.

In 1889 the Scottish Rifles again did well at the Review appearing for the first time in public in Full Dress (kilt etc.).

In 1890 the Corps applied to be allowed to attend the Easter Camp at National Park with the Militia but the request was refused - reason given was a shortage of tents. This was overcome privately and the camp was attended.

From that time onward the Regiment took part in every Easter Camp as continuous training has always been recognised as the most valuable portion of the year's work.

In 1900 the Commandant decided it was impracticable to hold a general camp. The Regiment was loath to forego this and appealed to members

of the general public to assist. A camp fund was established; many firms donated provisions. Military authorities supplied tents and transport and land owners gave use of land at Rhodes and Hornsby. The Regiment moved out on Thursday prior to Easter, trained at Rhodes until Sunday morning then marched out, crossed Parramatta River and proceeded along the Northern Road to near Hornsby, bivouacked overnight. carried out an exercise at the head of the Lane Cove River, had a meal at Turramurra and marched to Sydney in time to take part in a Review by the Commandant in the afternoon. The troops performed so well that the Regiment received an unsolicited praise from an Indian Officer and V.C. who said they would have done credit to the Black Watch, which he had known in India.

By the beginning of 1893 all other purely Volunteer Corps had either been disbanded or taken on to the Militia establishment. The Scottish Rifles alone survived.

In 1897 new Regiments and Corps sprang into existence and the existing units increased their numbers. By the end of the year the strength was as follows:-

The South African war broke out in October 1899 and the stimulus it gave to military ardour was felt in the Volunteer Regiments. By the end of 1900 the various unit strength were as follows:-

The Australian Horse had been transferred to the Militia Establishment a short time before.

The year 1901 was a memorable year. On January 3 the Commonwealth Review took place at Centennial Park before the Governor General - Earl of Hopetoun, at which were present representatives of all the Military Forces of all the various states but also the unique Imperial Contingent comprising detachments from many representative Regiments of the British Regular Army, Militia and Volunteers, as well as the Indian Native Army.

In March 1901 the various State Forces were taken over by the Commonwealth. All this was taking place while the South African War was going on.

They were always a joy to be part of or just witness - no one was put to expense - paper frocks, sheets and towels were all part of the fancy dress parades. The late Mr. & Mrs. Darby first started the Sunday School in their garage until 'not room enough' for all the children - like we read in the bible today "Not room enough at the Inn" for Mary's son to be born. Yet now, these days we can all give thanks to God for family and friends and for having been a part of this highway of life.

STEAM TRAM ACCIDENTS

It has been frequently stated (by this writer in a previous article, among others) that the only fatality associated with the Cronulla-Sutherland steam tram while running between 1912 and 1931, was that of driver Samuel Wyche, crushed in a well known accident outside Miranda in November 1924.

However, at least two other fatal accidents were associated, if somewhat indirectly, with the steam tram's operations.

On Monday 13 May 1912, not long after the service commenced, Alfred Horatio Sampson, aged seventy, was driving a horse drawn wagon between Miranda and Cronulla. A wealthy man, Mr Sampson was known to the public through his association with the Free Trade League, and his views were frequently published in the newspapers. Residing in Miranda, he was in the process of relocating to Cronulla, and had hired a horse drawn van to load furniture for the move. In Nicholson Parade, his horse confronted the steam tram and shied, overturning the wagon; Mr Sampson was pinned underneath and extricated with difficulty. A Doctor Martello, a passenger on the tram, attended the injured man, who was taken to his home at Miranda, suffering a fractured skull, and died the same afternoon. Charles Kinsela organised a funeral train to Woronora. Mr Sampson was father of nine; and his children inserted Death and In Memoriam notices in the newspapers for several years afterwards.

Near the end of the line, on 15 June 1931, a thirteen year old schoolboy, Eric Arthur Morris, who lived in Taren Point Road, Taren Point was travelling as usual from Caringbah to Sutherland, to attend the only High School in the shire, at the time. On a Monday that was described as heavily. fogged, which may have been a factor when he fell beneath the tram while alighting in Princes Highway Sutherland. He was conveyed by Sutherland Ambulance (their new station, now a saddlery, was almost at the scene of the accident) to Kogarah Hospital, but was dead on arrival. Kinsela again organised a funeral train to Sutherland, where Eric Morris was interred in heavy rain.

At Sutherland, a ticket office still survives, converted to a real estate agency. Tracks which originally ran beside the Kingsway and Princes Highway disappeared when these roads were upgraded to multi-laned traffic.Superseded by bus routes and, from 1939, the railway from Sutherland to Cronulla, the steam tram operated for less than twenty years.

The full route and inspections available have not yet been con-firmed, but we can promise you a most interesting day.



Secretary's report 1994

1993 saw the Shire of Sutherland become Sutherland Shire and the title of the President changed to Mayor. Councillor Ian Swords became the first Mayor of Sutherland Shire.

The year saw a broadening of our horizons. Heritage week took on a different look with innovative ideas such as a history of radio in Australia and our memories were stirred hearing recordings of such shows as "Greenbottle" and "Ada and Elsie."

There were many demands for speakers to address local functions. Mrs. Griffiths was able to talk at meetings taking with her slides and photo-graphs to illustrate the subject .matt. To assist with these talks the society purchased a Hanimex Projector and a daylight screen

Restoration of old photographs continues with the guidance of Miss H. McDonald financially assisted by the council grant.

The Heritage committee completed their inventory of houses and other buildings worthy or preservation in the shire.

Committee members have endeavoured to address the many enquiries from people seeking information of earlier shire residents when researching family trees etc.

We were saddened by the sudden death of Mr. Ralph Brinsley. A committee member Ralph had a wide knowledge of early Sutherland and gave generously of his time and labour to the society.

Many donations keeping alive the history of the shire were handed to us for display purposes and we have been lucky enough to have the area for storage and display increased.

Our monthly meetings are now held in the comfortable rooms of the Council Chambers in Eton Street, Sutherland commencing at 7.45pm. Executive meetings are held in the annex of the Anglican church, Belmont Street, Sutherland. We are indebted to both the Council and the Church for this accommodation.

EXCURSION ANNUAL REPORT

The May outing was to Mittagong area, guided by Mrs. Chalker from that Society, seeing parts of that lovely country town most of us didn't know existed. It surely is historic.

After lunch we had a quick trip to Kurnell and Pt. HERITAGE WEEK 1993

GENERAL

The topic chosen for 1993 Heritage Week was "The Golden Years of Radio" and it provided a very different atmosphere. The principal displays were the schoolroom, a collection of vintage radios, photographs of radio personalities of the Golden Tears, a limited collection of house-hold items, a photograph and camera display, a stand of photographs of old Sutherland Shire, and recorded programmes of those days from the Archives.

Display items and furniture were provided by members and the museum. Transport was provided by members, members' family and the Library. Handling and positioning was done by the same group. Assistance on site vas given by Entertainment Centre Staff.

ATTENDANCES

Attendances were well down on previous Years. Recorded attendance of adults at the Entertainment Centre is 638 (750 last year). Attendance at the museum during the week was negligible, the only recorded attend-woe was on Sunday 4th April when 50 adults and 20 children attended as a result of the tourist bus stopping there. Last year many school students passed through the museum after seeing plays, but this time they did not "because they did not have the time". Many did not attend the Entertainment Centre for the same reason. Children this year 458, (1993) previous year 920 (1992).

All visitors, adults and school children, exhibited a high level of interest. The low attendance of school children is attributed to affairs within the schools, because all were notified.

The work in setting up and clearing the displays was increased by the new arrangements in Eton Street, necessitating the handling of display from the rear entrance in Merton Street.

THE FUTURE

The age of workers increases, and for this reason the number of "these people decreases.

Choice of a new topic of principal interest has become difficult as most applicable subjects have now been presented.

Acquisitions are from St John's Anglican Church Sutherland, which is about to celebrate its 100th anniversary: The old bell and the eagle.


